Course: Drawing and Painting

Course Summary:

This class is designed to teach you how to draw and paint, and it is also designed to teach you to express yourself, problem solve, and to learn about who you are as a person. We will have several projects that relate to drawing and painting. You will keep a sketchbook to keep and improve your drawing skills. You will also have a separate journal for journal entries and our daily responses, but they can be in just one.

Key Learning Objectives:

Students will learn basics elements and principles of art through exploration of drawing and painting techniques.

Students will be exposed to works of drawing and painting, many that have frequent cultural references.

Students will produce their own drawings and paintings.

Students will leave with an understanding the role drawing and painting plays in society.

Students will leave knowing whether they would like to continue exploring more advanced drawing and painting opportunities in the future.

Students will explore their own self-identity through drawing and painting.

Key Learning Strategy

Students will be exposed to drawing and painting and be able to discuss art using the vocabulary of elements and principles as well as further deep discussion about the impact of drawing and painting.

Students will create drawings and paintings, while experiencing the processes of failure and success, learning new ways of doing things, and thinking creatively in all other parts of their lives.
